Why are we the North West Region of u3as

The role of the committee is to support our NW Trustee by facilitating contact and planning events our members can share and enjoy. A decision to form a committee was taken by our north west groups in 2008 and the region with its officially registered title above is now a registered charity (1159091). This is why we must organise an AGM. To make it more interesting we organise activities in the hope that this will encourage members to attend.

Venues

Finding venues for our regional events is not easy. It is often a 'bone of contention' for some members. When choosing a venue, we have to assess cost, accessibility, comfort and refreshments. We try to ensure they are close to transport routes from across the region.

The three most used are the Quaker Meeting House in Liverpool; which has the most rooms available for breakout activities, the Exchange in Preston and the Gateway Centre in Warrington. We have also occasionally used the Quaker Meeting House in Manchester.

All have advantages and disadvantages but the Liverpool venue has been the most popular with our members.



If we do something too far north, the southern groups can't reach them and too far south causes the same problem in reverse.

Obviously we welcome suggestions for other venues that meet our requirements and we continue to hold some meetings online so that people who are unable to travel can join. Hybrid meetings are sometimes possible if a venue has the right facilities.

Calling all Cryptic Crossword Groups

Last year, Knutsford Cryptic Crossword Group devised an on-line quiz comprising cryptic clues linked to a specific theme (e.g. Musical Instruments) and challenged Chester's group to solve it. In the spirit of friendly rivalry Chester did so and responded with a quiz of their own.

This has developed into a regular event with both groups finding it a useful source of Homework for their members and practice in both solving and setting clues.

Knutsford and Chester groups are now seeking new participants, at

the same time extending contacts and cooperation between existing groups. We would like to invite you join a bi-monthly Cryptic Quiz Challenge.

Initially, a Taster Quiz is proposed. There could then be a six-month Series in which the member groups would take it in turns to be Quizmaster and set the clues, say around 15, on their own theme. The Quizmaster subsequently issues the solutions, receives " scores" from the participants and provides feedback on the outcome. It is not proposed to issue individual results.

Knutsford are willing to issue and coordinate the Taster and the initial quiz. It would then rotate.

New trustee at the Third Age Trust

It is pleasing to report that David Blanchflower, a trustee of the Aughton & Ormskirk u3a, has been elected by the u3as located in the North West Region as a trustee of the Third Age Trust.

Introducing himself David says – "I am currently a public Governor of Preston Royal NHS Hospital and was previously a Public Governor at Liverpool Royal NHS Hospital. I am a regular volunteer with the National Trust. My involvement with the Aughton and Ormskirk U3A is as a Trustee, member of the finance committee, group leader and have previously held the position of Chair of the Group Support Committee. I was a trustee of a national charity for over 40 years, holding the position of Chair, Treasurer and Chair of the Media Committee for 20 years."

The u3a Third Age Trust is the UK-wide body that represents over a 1,000 u3as with around 400,000 members in the UK. The Trust works with local u3as providing guidance, learning and administrative support.

The Trust is overseen by Trustees who are the Board of Directors and have legal responsibility for the decision-making processes that form and shape the future of the u3a movement.

The Third Age Trust provides practical central support to u3as. This ranges from guidance, advice, model documents and policies such as constitutions, policies on areas relating to data protection, finance, insurance, legal risk assessments — to marketing materials and guidance on website, communications and branding. David is looking forward in the coming months to being invited to attend the meetings of the Cluster/Region groups in the North West Region.
